

4. Mandate on open access to publications

The detailed legal requirements on open access to publications are contained in article 29.2 of the Model Grant Agreement.

Under Horizon 2020, each beneficiary must ensure open access to all peer-reviewed scientific publications relating to its results.

In order to comply with this requirement, beneficiaries must, at the very least, ensure that their publications, if any, can be read online, downloaded and printed. However, as any additional rights such as the right to copy, distribute, search, link, crawl, and mine increase the utility of the accessible publication, beneficiaries should make every effort to provide for as many of them as possible.


'Peer-reviewed' publications refer to publications that have been evaluated by peers, i.e. other scholars. Peer review is typically, yet not exclusively, organised by the journal or publisher to which an article or manuscript is submitted. New approaches to the organisation of peer review are expected to become more prevalent in the coming years.

The dominant type of peer-reviewed scientific publication is the journal article. In addition, however, beneficiaries are strongly encouraged to provide open access to other types of scientific publications, some of which may, in some cases, not be peer-reviewed, including monographs, books, conference proceedings and grey literature (informally published written material not controlled by scientific publishers, e.g. reports).









DOAB for publishers

The Directory of Open Access Books (DOAB) is a discovery service for Open Access monographs. DOAB provides a searchable index to peer-reviewed monographs and edited volumes published under an Open Access business model, with links to the full texts of the publications at the publisher's website or repository.

Academic publishers are invited to provide the metadata of their Open Access books to DOAB. Metadata are harvestable in order to maximize dissemination, visibility and impact. Aggregators can integrate the records in their commercial services and libraries can integrate the directory into their online catalogues, thereby helping scholars, students and the general public to discover the books. DOAB is open to all academic publishers: The directory aims to cover all subject areas and all languages and should contain as many books as possible.

Requirements

DOAB determines requirements for participation by publishers, in consultation with the participating publishers and the DOAB Advisory Board. The current requirements have been specified by the OAPEN Foundation in consultation with OASPA. The current requirements to take part in DOAB are twofold:

- Academic books in DOAB shall be available under an Open Access license (such as a Creative Commons license)
- · Academic books in DOAB shall be subjected to independent and external peer review prior to publication

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The policies and procedures regarding peer review and licensing should be clearly outlined on the publisher's website. More information about these requirements can be found in the OASPA Membership Criteria.

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Peer review info

Peer-Review at the FWF: All funded books pass through an independent academic peer review process prior to publication. Either the FWF or the publisher handle the peer review process. The FWF asks for at least one written review from an international renowned expert outside of Austria. In cases where the publisher itself handles the peer review process, the publisher has to ask for at least two peer reviews meeting the requirements of the FWF. This means: Reviews must not be carried out by persons who may have or may be suspected to have a conflict of interest with regard to the authors, editors or other persons involved in the publication. Reviewers are considered to have a conflict of interest in cases where they might benefit personally or financially from the approval or rejection of the application. The same applies to cases where reviewers have worked at the same research institution, published or cooperated with the applicant or another person involved in the publication in the last five years, or where the reviewers have fundamental differences of scholarly opinion or close professional and/or personal relationships with the applicant or another person involved in the publication. Scholars who work in Austria must not be called in as reviewers. Peer reviews must be meaningful and comparable with reviews obtained by the FWF. Publishers could only conduct the peer review by themselves if they have an international peer review process for the selection of publications. The review process must be described in a transparent manner on the web site of the publisher.

Should the Consumption of Animal Products Be Banned?

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
In this book, Jan Deckers addresses the most crucial question that people must deliberate in relation to how we should treat other animals: whether we should eat animal products.


Many people object to the consumption of animal products from the conviction that it inflicts pain, suffering, and death upon animals. This book argues that a convincing ethical theory cannot be based on these important concerns: rather, it must focus on our interest in human health. Tending to this interest demands not only that we extend speciesism—the attribution of special significance to members of our own species merely because they belong to the same species as ourself —towards nonhuman animals, but also that we safeguard the integrity of nature.

In this light, projects that aim to engineer the genetic material of animals to reduce their capacities to feel pain and to suffer are morally suspect. The same applies to projects that aim to develop invitro flesh, even if the production of such flesh should be welcomed on other grounds.

The theory proposed in this book is accompanied by a political goal, the 'vegan project', which strives for a qualified ban on the consumption of animal products. Deckers also provides empirical evidence that some support for this goal exists already, and his analysis of the views of others—including those of slaughterhouse workers—reveals that the vegan project stands firm in spite of public opposition.

Many charges have been pressed against vegan diets, including: that they alienate human beings from nature; that they increase human food security concerns; and that they are unsustainable. Deckers





A proposal, subjected to fully closed review; a subsequent manuscript subjected to peer-to-peer




A manuscript subjected to fully closed cross review, with an attendant dataset subjected to partially closed cross review.

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
